By the sixth grade, teachers are encouraging students to develop a solid foundation in all of the essential math areas. Your student may learn anything from basic number sense, such as how numbers fall on a number line, to the area and volume of basic shapes.

Five Strategies for Teaching Reading Skills to 4th-6th Graders

Have a “Pass Along a Poem” day during which students give away copies of their favorite poems. 2. Hold a poetry slam or do a “flash poem” (like a flash mob, minus the dancing and music) in the middle of lunch. 3. Publish a class collection of favorite and original poems. 4. Read or act out humorous poems for younger students.

Sixth grade spelling words will teach students how vowels behave when located next to one another and how they act when separated by clusters of consonants. Teach students to include both a sequence of events and thoughts and feelings about the events in a personal narrative. Teach students to map out the plot of their narrative by writing each event on the front of an index card and their thoughts or feelings about the event on the back of an index card.
